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Inside-Out Program at UNA

The Inside-Out Prison Exchange Program, which recently celebrated its 20th anniversary, is based on the belief that our society is strengthened when higher education is made widely accessible and allows participants to encounter each other as equals, often across profound social barriers. The practice of bringing incarcerated ("inside") and non-incarcerated ("outside") people together for engaged and informed dialogue allows for transformative learning experiences that invite participants to take leadership in addressing crime, justice, and other issues of social concern. In Spring 2018, this program entered Alabama for the first time through a partnership between UNA and Limestone Correctional Facility. Together, "inside" and "outside" students take a course that is delivered by Dr. Katie Owens-Murphy at Limestone Correctional Facility in Harvest, Alabama. This interdisciplinary course, titled "Restorative Justice in American Literature," is cross-listed with political science and criminal justice. Students discuss readings in a seminar-style environment and work on capstone group projects that apply principles of restorative justice to individual case studies.

The Third Annual Pioneer Con 2018 saw the largest crowd Jefferson State Community College's Sigma Kappa Delta (SKD) chapter for this event, proving that offering such a fun, academic, and worthwhile conference will see growth!

The panels offered this year were just one of the many features that drew crowds this year. SKD sponsors and officers were excited to see the variety of proposals and the variety of presenters for the sessions. Proposals included sci-fi and fantasy in not only English and literature, but also in biology, theater, mass media, and game or role play. Presenters included an array (continued on page 3) of students from Jefferson State Community
College and other colleges like the University of
Montevallo, and the University of Alabama at
Huntsville. Instructors at Jefferson State,
including English instructors Eugene Cuevas,
Ashley Kitchens, and Jacob Melvin; theater
instructor Leslie Warren; and biology
instructor Erin Arnold presented or worked
with students to present panel discussions or
lead RPG sessions.

All the panels had something different to offer in the way of academic discussion or presentation. Session one held a choice of panels that, one, illustrated a dramatic reading of She Kills Monsters by Qui Nguyen, and two, examined the complex relationship between humans and machines in literature and movies. Session two saw lots of opportunity for conference goers as it added a Dungeons & Dragons mini-campaign and aerial silk presentations along with the academic choices "Anatomy of a Dragon" or "The Predictive Elements of Black Mirror."

After the keynote address featuring fantasy author Phoebe North and lunch, session three offered attendees another chance at a D&D campaign, and two discussions: one session gave practical advice and planning and spending tips for cosplay, and the other session looked at gaming in a liberal arts university. The last session of the day continued a look into game play with a panel on using gaming to facilitate social discussions and a panel on law and order in games like Persona 5.

Overall, survey results show students and other attendees enjoyed the sessions they attended. SKD hopes to continue this wonderful tradition called Pioneer Con in order to give students, faculty, and the academic community a chance to be a part of something fun and engaging. SKD sponsors also hope to continue to reach students and faculty in colleges around the state, giving them presentation opportunity and experience.
